Sarah Ostler was the coach of the victorious WV Rockets and she has coached the boys since U7. Winning the U11 Community cup was the crowning moment for Sarah and the boys.

The victory was hard won. The Rockets had won and lost about the same proportion of games throughout the regular season.

The final game of the Community Cup was played against the Lynn Valley Superchargers at Mahon on Saturday March 6, 2004. The game was tied 1:1 at half time. The Lynn Valley team scored a goal early in second half. WV hearts sank. But the Rockets rallied and scored two goals. Final score 3:2 for West Vancouver.

Sarah credits the win to shooting practice just before the cup series. She put blue tarps over the right and left sides of the goal to encourage players to avoid kicking at the GK. They loved the "whacking" noise of the ball hitting the tarps.

David Thistle was the coach who led Rockies, the WV U11girls who won the Community Cup. He said the team won though a true team effort throughout entire season.

Three girls attended goalie clinic when

it was offered, which resulted in the team having superior goaltending. Defence including the team's tiny sweepers became impassable. Many other teams commented on how tough they played.

"Midfielders were our strength" David said, "creating passing, give and goes, like no other team. Forwards exhibited skilled play, quick feet, moves that impressed everyone."

David attributes the team's win to many factors, but mostly to the fact

# Post Enlightenment : D-lights set Neighbours A-light

**T**est Vancouver District showed wisdom when it opted for a state-of-the-art lighting system for the new turf at Ambleside D and E. When WV District staff went to check how the worked new lights from the perspective of neighbours' homes, they were pleased to see that the new fields were well lit, but that the tall light posts and calibrated deflectors ensured light did not spill over to where it was not wanted. The new lights at D and E looked so good that they made the older lights at Ambleside А look bad. The neighbours, after many years of looking at a local fixture, suddenly saw Ambleside A in an altogether new light. The lights at A were installed in November 1993 and WVSC contributed to the cost of their purchase and installation.

Having heard the neighbours' concerns about the lights at A, the District approached WVSC with some possible remedies. One possibility is to replace the lights with new and better ones, at significant cost. The District also suggested that we consider moving practices to an alternative field.

Having experienced how difficult it was to get lights installed and to use them at West Bay, we have to ask "WHERE?" WVSC wants to be fair and considerate to neighbours, but 2,000 WV soccer-playing kids need suitable fields on which to practice. Presently, we see no acceptable alternative to Ambleside A.

WVSC Board have met and exchanged letters with the District and we are making an earnest effort to find a suitable solution. We will keep you posted of developments as they occur.

# New WVSC Website makes 2004-2005 Registration Smoother

# The Soccer Lifecycle: A Primer for New Soccer Parents

o your son or daughter just started soccer in West Vancouver and you wonder what you are in for. I can tell you certainly, that you will do thousands of miles of additional driving, spend many weekends and evenings between September and March huddled under an umbrella, with wet and cold feet and you will do a lot more laundry.

For your trouble, your child will have more fun and learn more life lessons than you can likely provide in any other way. Soccer does not only get kids outside in the winter and provide them with important exercise. Soccer teaches responsibility to peers, the value of friendship, compromise and balancing competitive instincts with other important objectives. Youth community soccer helps to build successful citizens.

West Vancouver Soccer Club began in 1925 and we have coaches who themselves started playing soccer as young kids in West Vancouver. It all starts at about five years old.

# Street Soccer Program (Kindergarten to Grade 1)

Five and six year olds love to kick a ball with their friends and the current thinking is that at this age it is best to capitalize on this phenomenon and not risk extinguishing the fun factor with too many rules and too much instruction. So the first year of soccer (U6) in West Vancouver is mostly supervised fun, playing three and four a side games and getting acquainted with the rudimentary aspects of soccer. Staff coaches provide coaching and facilitation of games.

Be prepared for very informal instruction and lots of playing time. This first year is scary for some players, while exciting for others. The staff coaches work hard to make it an enjoyable experience for all players. However, players should be prepared to play with different kids from within their larger "team" each Saturday. For more details visit "pee-wee soccer" on www.westvansoccer.com.

Parents should encourage and not coach from the sidelines. Cheer them on! Shin pads are mandatory and cleats are strongly recommended. Remember to bring a water bottle and a small snack to each game. Most games go rain or shine. Kids don't mind the rain as much as the parents do.

By U7 we start to form teams of up to twelve players and introduce parent coaches and managers to work with staff coaches and run mid-week practices. The games are still only four a side, with the introduction of a goalkeeper. Though teams are formed players are still mixed up for games each Saturday. Parent coaches focus on skills during practices while Saturday games remain informal. For more details visit "pee-wee soccer" on <u>www.westvansoccer.com</u>.

# More Advanced Pee-Wee (Grades 2 to 4)

Competitive soccer starts in earnest in U8. Teams are formed, usually by clustering kids by school and neighbourhood. We try to avoid having single-school teams, as there are advantages to kids having friends in more than one place.

Games are six-aside, which allows lots of contact with the ball and opportunities to rest, between spurts on the field. Your kid's team will play on Saturdays against U8 teams from North Vancouver and other WV teams. You will get to know the gravel patches of the North Shore very well. Keep a map book in your car.

Typically, U8 girls' and boys' teams are heterogeneous, in every aspect. Some kids show right away. Others take longer. Parents who have seen it all before know better than to conclude at this age who the strong players are and who are not. Attitude is a better indicator of future prospects than goals scored.

Between U8 and U11 some kids leave the team and others join it, but for the most part, the players and parents become cohesive and friendly. The coach teaches, gives all players plenty of play time and rotates all players though all positions over the course of the season.

By U9 most players know as much about soccer rules as many parents. After Christmas, they get introduced to the off-side rule.

U10 is a significant step up. Teams on the North Shore go from playing six a side to nine a side. Players develop a greater sense of positions and team inter-dependence. It becomes more difficult for individual players to repeatedly score goals. Some kids find this transition more difficult than do others. But this is just a prelude to bigger transitions, soon to come.

At the end of the regular season in early March, WV U10 players who are keen enough have an opportunity to play more soccer at a higher level on a development team. These teams that play in tournaments from March to June, are formative and set the foundation for competitive soccer in later years.

# U11 - The Transition Year (Grade 5)

The players who participated on U10 development teams are expected to return to their regular (now U11) peewee teams in the fall and help the rest of the team advance their overall level of team play. U11 is the last year of non-selective teams. In the spring of the U11 year, players can tryout for gold and silver U12 teams.

WVSC provides camps and extra staff coaching support during the U11 year. Especially important are the free skills camps held over spring break.

The end of U11 is both a happy and a sad time. Kids and parents who have got to know each other well over four or five years realize that an era is over and players will go to different teams, depending on their strengths in and commitment levels to soccer.

# U12 – The Big Shift to Divisional Soccer (Grade 6)

There is always anxiety surrounding the U12 tryouts. In fact, while it is possible for a keen player to have a bad tryout and not make the team he or she should be on, it is a rare occurrence. Some weight is given to coach's evaluations and other factors. And even if a player does not achieve the 5

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level they want in U12, tryouts are used to assemble teams in U13 all the way to U18. Every spring presents a fresh opportunity. (see "Precious Cargo to Precious Metals" in the Spring 2003 issue of *Sidelines* on www.westvansoccer.com. Most players find that they have more

fun playing with players of comparable skill and commitment level. Stronger players are challenged more at the Gold level and Silver-B (girls) and Bronze (boys) players suddenly have the ball for more of the game.

U12 teams play teams at the same level from various parts of the Lower Mainland. Teams are not seeded at U12, but are grouped geographically. WV teams usually play teams clustered near Highway 1. Results of league games are posted on www.youthsoccerbc.com.

In addition to league play, there are various cup series. WV U12 teams usually do well in cup competition. Inter-District Cup, Coastal Cup, Provincial Cup competition differs at all levels and for boys and girls and you can understand it by visiting www.youthsoccerbc.com and www.bcsoccer.net, from October on.

Starting in about November, BC Soccer Association starts its tryout process for the U12 girls' and boys' Provincial Academy teams. Check out www.bcsoccer.net for details.

### U13 – Another Transition Year (Grade 7)

U13 teams typically see some changes after tryouts, but have many of the same players as they did in U12. This is usually true in other parts of the Lower Mainland too. League play in U13 therefore, is seeded and grouped according to U12 league play results. This often means you will drive further to some games than you did in U12.

Starting in about November, BC Soccer Association starts its tryout process for the U13 girls' and boys' Provincial Academy teams. Check out <u>www.bcsoccer.net</u> for details. An alternative to the Provincial Academy team is the North Shore Intra-Provincial (IPL) team. Information about the tryout process for the IPL team will likely be posted on the BC Soccer site as well as on the North Shore Soccer Development Centre site <u>http://www.nssdc.net</u>.

At the end of U13, teams are once again dismembered and reconstituted. Tryouts are held for Metro teams. WV has U14 and U15 Metro teams presently, but no others. WV boys at U14 and above and girls from U16 and above who want to play at the Metro level must play for teams sponsored by other North Shore clubs. WV players can tryout for WV U14 and above gold and silver teams.

# U14 to U18 Soccer

Players who make Metro teams are expected to make soccer their main Development is the main sport. objective of all but metro teams (see "Bench it Like Beckham" in Sidelines Winter 2003 issue on www.westvansoccer.com). Metro teams are elite units that play to win. Playtime, positioning are governed as much by situational expediency than by player development considerations. Metro players take on a large responsibility, including principal onus for their own development.

U14 allows some U13 Silver players with promise to play Gold and some Gold players to develop into potential Metro players in U15 or later. Some players find that the commitment required at Metro is more than they are prepared to give one sport and play at another level or sometimes (regrettably) quit soccer. So there is usually a significant amount of movement between teams and levels from U14 to U18.

Provincial teams in U14 and U16 get to play in national competitions and BC team players get an opportunity to be identified for possible selection for national teams. So the interest in trying out for the BC provincial teams is high at these age groups. Starting in about November BC Soccer Association starts its tryout process for the U14 and older girls' and boys' Provincial teams. Check out www.bcsoccer.net for details. Two excellent alternatives to the Provincial teams are the "Whitecaps Super Y teams" and the North Shore Intra-Provincial (IPL) teams. Information about the tryout process for the IPL team will likely be posted on the BC Soccer site as well as on the North

# U12 to U18 Bronze and Silver B Soccer

I've said enough said about elite and highly competitive divisional soccer. WVSC also has many players who enjoy playing soccer every year without ever trying out. It is not necessary for kids who want a broader mix of priorities to give up soccer. Metro, Gold and Silver teams demand a lot of player's time and commitment. Bronze (boys) and Silver-B (girls) allow participation at a more relaxed level. No tryouts are held for these teams, though players are still expected to show a sense responsibility to their coach and teammates.

### Soccer is Not All About Winning

West Vancouver Soccer Club is committed to facilitating fun and satisfying soccer to players of all skill levels. While everyone enjoys a victory, winning is desert and having fun is the main course. This is as true for metro as it is for bronze. Of course, never winning can test anyone's sense of fun.

A large part of the enjoyment of playing soccer over time derives from a sense that one is getting better at it. Development therefore, is all important. WVSC is fortunate to have Jamshid Afshar (Jammer) as its head coach. Jammer will get to know your son or daughter and will quietly mentor him or her. Read about Jammer in "Head to Head with WVSC Head Coach" in *Sidelines* Fall 2002 issue on www.westvansoccer.com).

### A Word about Soccer Parents

Parents are the backbone of West Vancouver Soccer Club. We make it possible for our players to play and as I mentioned at the beginning of this article, we are long suffering. It is important that we mature as soccer parents as our children mature as players. Every year, unpleasant incidents occur on sidelines, when over-exuberant, aggressive parents allow emotions to spill over. We must govern ourselves and other parents on our teams with the recognition that we too are teaching, as we watch. West Vancouver Soccer Club is run by volunteer parents. If you have some soccer background, we are always in need of more good coaches.

If your kids love soccer, but you can't coach, consider being a team manager, an age group coordinator or getting elected to the board. Even just driving other people's kids to practices and games is contributing to team and club effort.

If you are a new soccer parent, welcome to the club. Wear warm socks, buy a good umbrella and get rubber mats for the back seat floor of your car. It is likely a long time before your player will be driving him/herself to play, referee or coach games.

Having artificial turf fields gives West Vancouver soccer a level of confidence about our ability to play in most types of weather that we never had before.

Of course, this advantage came at a cost. The District obtained the new fields from MondoTurf at an excellent price, but even so, the price was substantial. For the club has meant somewhat higher field rental costs and for our members, slightly higher fees.

Another reminder; Coaches and players <u>only</u>, are allowed on the field. Managers and parents are to stand on the walkway or the stand. Coaches and players must stay in the technical area/box.
